Worship in the Time of a Pandemic

With this article, I am initiating our parish's response to Governor Parson's publication of new orders concerning social interaction in business and in other public places, and the special instructions from Bishop McKnight on the continued implementation of his decrees on pastoral activity during this time of pandemic. Looking at the trends in cases of COVID-19 in Miller and Camden counties and reviewing the public regulations issued by county authorities, we can discern the steps that must be put in place for the faithful's participation in worship services throughout the week and at the Sunday and Saturday vigil masses.

I urge all our parishioners and any visitors at the Lake to consider our re-engagement in public services in terms of the script of a play. A dramatic script guides the characters in the action for when, where, and how they should move about. There is a difference though. We are not in the world of make-believe and our actions will have real-world consequences in regard to our community's health and well-being.

On Tuesday, May 5th, 2020, religious services at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church will be open to limited public attendance. Folks who are not symptomatic or in elevated risks categories may enter church and participate. Understanding the protocols outlined in the governor's and the Bishop's instructions in regard to social



distancing and hygiene precautions requires us to do things a little differently. All those who are entering the church will be required to wear a mask, following the recommendations of the CDC and the stated instruction of the Bishop. Guidance will be given as to what doors will be used for entering and exiting, using only the doors that open directly into the vestibule or the church and not allowing access through the office entrance or Fellowship Hall doors. Pews and aisles will be clearly marked to assist with social distancing. Clear instructions will be provided for the reception of communion.

We will begin by allowing participation in daily mass on Tuesday morning and attendance at Adoration and Benediction on Wednesday afternoon, followed by mass. Throughout next week we will continue to monitor how the script is working and make adjustments as needed, with daily mass at 8:00 am on Thursday and Friday also open to the faithful. The goal is to allow the faithful

Bookkeeping Terms Explained:

In our weekly parish collection corner we use Envelope & Loose. Categorized under Envelope are all contributions taken in from active parishioners during the week. Obviously it is included if it comes in an envelope or designated a recurring contribution online, but it also is included if it is a loose check or online donation under \$1000 that has not been designated toward a specific purpose. Active parishioners are those who have chosen to designate Our Lady of the Lake their home parish.

Loose includes anything that comes loose in the collection basket and checks and online donations from our visitors and part-timers whose home parish is elsewhere.

Any check or online amount over \$1000 not designated to a specific purpose is considered a donation and is not included in the Envelopes. We have received some of these recently and are extremely grateful for your generosity.

Leader Needed




EASTER FLOWERS



NOTES FROM VICKI

Dear Friends in Christ,
 We are already at the Fourth Sunday of Easter, and life is moving right along with or without us appreciating the history that is being made. I contend that this week's gospel is very representative of our situation, and I wish to use all this craziness to point out some direction I have been instructed to share. That voice we hear, when we listen close enough, has been a constant small buzz for over a year now. Life moves along at a pre-determined paced called 'time,' and we humans measure that with a calendar of days, weeks and months. The Catholic Church uses a Liturgical Calendar, and I am finding many parishioners are not aware of its' significance. For the most part I am simply re-grouping the youth ministry to closely follow this Liturgical Calendar; embracing the lessons of the liturgy used in Mass for the coming Sunday. I am not re-writing anything, only relying on the written Word presented at Mass to hopefully straighten our trajectory toward a personal relationship with Christ. ("The liturgy is the summit toward which all activity of the Church is directed..." CCC 1074) My writings here will reflect the 'big idea' that Msgr Mak wants us to receive, which biblical author is writing the verses of the week, and ideas for families to explore. I greatly desire to open a door into the Life and Times of Jesus Christ; what influences were happening in the world at large, what Jesus was up to at the time and what He is trying to tell us on a weekly basis.

For example, this week's readings and Gospel are definitely aimed at bringing all of us together through baptism, instruction in the Word of God and using the parable of the Good Shepherd. Keep in mind that during Jesus' lifetime, sheep and goats were

a symbol of wealth, daily sustenance for food, milk, clothing and meat. The blood of lambs was symbolically painted over the doors to protect their children during the Passover, an ancient tradition proclaimed during the Old Testament. The significance and importance of sheep was part of the culture, whereas we tend to think of sheep as docile, unintelligent beings that make warm sweaters! God inspires this analogy of His children as sheep; to follow His voice, to meekly inherit His kingdom, to be protected and guided by boundless love! John 10:1-10 tells of Jesus being the 'gate' for the sheep and any other entrance will not lead to Heaven.

During this time in history, Jesus had already been crucified and raised from the dead. He had entered heaven, seated at the right hand of His Father!

- We are in the last part of the first century when John writes most of his works from circa 85-95 A.D. He was getting older and Jesus had been gone for over 20 years when John began writing. It was imperative that the stories be recorded and the Gospels were all compiled in nearly the same time period.

- One remarkable incident took place in 64 A.D. when Christians were blamed for a great fire in Rome. Nero was not happy and did away with thousands of Christians.

- In 1990, a first century burial cave was discovered south of Jerusalem. Later, archeologists discovered it was likely the family 'cemetery' for Caiaphas' family. He was the priest mentioned in Matthew 26 and John 18. Remember Caiaphas was the priest who brought Jesus to trial.

- Stephen, the first Christian martyr was stoned to death in 35 A.D. The painting is a Rembrandt, "The Stoning of St Stephen," done in 1625 at age 19. Notice the dark and

light portions of the painting and the position of people in relation to Stephen.

While the liturgy this week takes place during the first century, the rest of the world continued to move through history. In 44 AD, the title of 'Christian' was first used in Antioch and King Herod Agrippa is still trying to get rid of them! James is executed, Peter is in prison, Judea is battling famine and those Christians in Antioch are sending their own relief supplies. (I'll bet their famine lasted longer than the Coronavirus; each and every day contending with the lack of necessities)

Jerusalem is still standing today, visited continuously by those who wish to step where Jesus stepped. His life is well documented, but the Bible does not always portray a picture that we can associate with in our daily life. I am from Missouri so you gotta' show me the 'whys' and 'wherefores' that give meaning to things I cannot experience personally. Historical art has always fascinated me and helped with images I could never create with my stick people! My goal is to bring the bible to life, take you on Jesus' journey feeling the dust on your feet and putting into perspective the surrounding history. I hope to accomplish this well enough that you have more questions and are motivated to learn more about Christ as a person.

Here are some conversation starters to help you connect with your family, neighbors and friends or folks you are talking to 'across the room' today! These questions are not theological and do not require anyone to enter into a philosophical discussion. Let me know if you get all the answers. DEACON'S CORNER

Today is Good Shepherd Sunday! It is a day when we pray for our shepherds, our pastors, who lead our Catholic communities. These shepherds are our Deacons, Priests, Bishops and Popes who, as our shepherds, protect and assist us from going astray.

Shepherds have a very intimate relationship with their flock, spending all day with them. Always a short distance away from the flock, watching them graze and being aware of the surroundings and any danger which may come about throughout the day.

If danger appeared, the shepherd would protect his flock, even to the point of injury or perhaps death.

His passion for protection is since this flock of sheep is not only his livelihood, but they also become a part of him.

A family of his – so to speak. Blessed Stanley Rother was such a shepherd! A shepherd of souls. He was an ordinary priest who was brought to extraordinary feats through his faith.

Father Rother was born and reared in Okarche, OK, where his journey of faith began. He became a priest in the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City in 1963. His spiritual journey eventually led him as a missionary to Guatemala starting in 1968 to attend to the spiritual needs of the Tz'utujil Indians in the Parish of Santiago Apostol.

Due to political unrest between the government and anti-government rebels, and his name being on a death list, Father Rother was



sent back to the OKC diocese. After three months of being home he realized that the Tz'utujil Indians needed their Shepherd. Father Rother's spiritual zeal for the love of the Tz'utujil Indians was like a spiritual magnet drawing him to return knowing that his life could be at risk. He realized that the Shepherd did not run at the sign of danger. Father Rother's love, untiring work and unending faith led to his 1981 death by three unknown masked men within the rectory in the missionary in Guatemala. He was 46 years old.

Many times, we think of martyrs and saints to being of a time long ago. In reality, there had been more martyrs for the Christian faith in the 20th Century than in any other. Blessed Stanley Rother is not only from the 20th century but also right from Mid America. Blessed Stanley Rother was beatified in a ceremony in Oklahoma City on 23 September 2017. He is the first American Born Martyr in the United States.

Blessed Stanley Rother, The Shepherd, who loved his sheep, and did not run! For more information on Blessed Stanley Rother, I suggest the book, *The Shepherd Who Didn't Run* by Maria Ruiz Scaperlanda.

NOTICIAS DEL FELIGRÉS

Comenzaremos permitiendo la participación en la misa diaria el martes por la mañana y la asistencia a Adoración y Bendición el miércoles por la tarde, seguida de la misa. Durante la próxima semana continuaremos monitoreando cómo funciona el guión y haremos los ajustes necesarios, con una misa diaria a las 8:00 am los jueves y viernes también abierta a los fieles. El objetivo es permitir que los fieles asistan a una misa a las 5:00 p. M. El sábado por la noche el día 9 y a una misa a las 10:00 a. M. El domingo por la mañana y una misa a las 2:00 p. M. Estas horas nos permitirán hacer la limpieza necesaria después de los servicios.

Habrán varios guiones disponibles para que las personas los sigan para guiarlos en la decisión de participar en nuestra adoración mientras se minimiza el riesgo de contagio en nuestra comunidad. Si seguimos las pautas actuales, entonces no podemos permitir más de 150 personas en la iglesia al mismo tiempo. Si las personas no pueden seguir estos guiones, quedará claro que ahora no es el momento adecuado para unirse a la adoración pública. Tenga en cuenta que un cambio en las ordenanzas estatales y locales y un aumento en los casos activos diagnosticados de COVID-19 en los condados de Miller y Camden pueden justificar la reevaluación de la idoneidad del culto público en cualquier momento. Tómese el tiempo para estudiar los guiones para la misa diaria y dominical que se publican en el sitio web de nuestra parroquia en <https://ourladylake.diojeffcity.org/dailyscript> y <https://ourladylake.diojeffcity.org/sundayscript>.

Si los servicios del 4 al 8 de mayo van de acuerdo con el guión y determinamos que podemos permitir la participación pública en la adoración mientras minimizamos efectivamente el riesgo para nuestra salud, abriremos la iglesia a la participación de las misas del domingo con la misa del sábado por la noche. a las 5:00 PM el 9 de mayo y a las 10:00 AM Misa dominical el 10, con una misa en español a las 2:00.



to attend a 5:00 PM mass on Saturday evening the 9th and a 10:00 AM mass on Sunday morning and a 2:00 PM mass in Spanish on Sunday on the 10th. These hours will allow us to do the necessary cleaning after services.

There will be several scripts available for people to follow to guide them in the decision to participate in our worship while minimizing the risk of contagion in our community. If we follow current guidelines, then we can allow no more than 150 people in the church at one time. If people are not able to follow these scripts, then it will be clear that now isn't the right time for them to join in public worship. Keep in mind that a change in state and local ordinances and an increase in diagnosed active COVID-19 cases in Miller and Camden counties may warrant the reevaluation of the suitability of public worship at any time. I will begin reaching out to families who have been waiting to have their children baptized to schedule baptisms outside of mass. I will be working with Vicki and the respective teachers and the families to examine the scheduling of First Communions and Confirmation. In the meanwhile, the office and other areas of the facilities will remain closed to visitors. As much as possible the regular business of the parish will be conducted through teleconference.

Commission and parish groups will continue to teleconference their meetings until further notice. Special arrangements with Msgr. Makarewicz and other parish staff will need to take place for in person meetings, always keeping in mind best practices for social distancing. You may continue to drop off items in the vestibule of church or at the table outside the office entrance.

Should the services of May 4 to May 8 go according to the script and we determine that we can allow public participation in worship while effectively minimizing the risk to our health, we will open the church to participation for the Sunday masses with the Saturday evening mass at 5:00 PM on the 9th of May and 10:00 AM Sunday mass on the 10th, with a mass in Spanish at 2:00.

We understand that those with compromising health conditions are strongly urged to remain at home, so services will continue to be streamed on YouTube. Also know that seating will be somewhat limited in the Church so there may be services that take place where we cannot allow more people to enter. We are grateful that Bishop McKnight has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday mass through June 30. And a word of encouragement: Please remember that while one is not obliged to attend mass, the obligation to keep the Sabbath holy in some form can never be lifted. Now more than ever, we must be faithful in prayer and diligent in good works lest we be the servant caught unaware when the master returns.
