Continued Vigilance and Generosity of Spirit

In Governor Parson's executive order lifting statewide health restrictions on June 16, and Bishop McKnight's subsequent response to the executive order, local leadership has been called upon to assume a greater responsibility for keeping people healthy during this pandemic. Here are a few points to consider as we respond to a continuing crisis.

You hear this line a lot, "The safety of our customers (or students or fans or employees or visitors) is our primary goal." I often have a chuckle, depending on the context, because this phrase is used in countless press releases after a major accident where serious injury, loss of property, or even loss of life has occurred. Under my breath I mutter: no, your primary concern is making money, or protecting the reputation of the company, or minimizing responsibility of your institution. I would imagine that many others are tempted to that same cynicism when they hear these words too.

The pandemic has been a challenge to our integrity. Do we really put health, safety, and well-being first, and make uncompromising choices to support those values? Leaders in every community

are getting a serious lesson in walking the talk at this time.

I have been working with staff, commission leadership and membership, health care professionals, and fellow clergy to formulate and put into practice protocols for health and safety. We have all been making great sacrifices, letting go of so much that is important to us—companionship, our customary forms of worship, even enduring great economic hardship—in order to stay healthy and assist in keeping others healthy. We know health is a basic need. We are even willing to risk our own health for the good of another. We are also doing our best to ensure that we are not risking the health of others in meeting a less important need and perhaps self-serving need.

Given the recently documented COVID-19 transmissions in our surrounding community, and given that we host people from many different places not only from our state, but from farther away, it is expedient that we continue to be diligent in health and hygiene protocols. July 4 is on a Saturday



Getting Closer to God

Fr Oscar Lukefahr writes about a very efficient method of prayer for
those who just haven't gotten into the habit yet. He calls it the "Three
Minute Trinity Prayer."

Begin the "Three Minute Trinity Prayer" by placing yourself in God's
presence, adoring Father, Son and Holy Spirit with the sign of the cross and
the 'Glory Be to the Father' prayer. Then turn to Jesus and consider your
most serious failing in the past twenty-four hours. Ask Jesus to forgive you.
In the second minute, think about the greatest blessing you've received in
the past twenty four hours and thank God the Father for that blessing. In
the third minute, look ahead to the greatest challenge that faces you in the
next twenty four hours, and ask the Holy Spirit to be your helper and guide
as you accept that challenge. I've used this prayer daily for many years. It
includes adoration, contrition, thanksgiving and supplication (ACTS). * It
can strengthen your relationship with Father, Son and Holy Spirit, helping
us realize that each of us is 'the temple of the living God' (2 Corinthians
6:16)

NOTES FROM VICKI

Dear Friends in Christ!

My intention for the next few weeks is to educate all of us, including myself, about the most traditional Saints of the Catholic Church. The more I read about them, the more I feel called to share their lives and convictions in God's mercy. Two stand out this week; St Thomas More, and John the Baptist. St Thomas is recognized on the calendar of the Catholic Church on June 22, while we celebrate the Feast of John the Baptist on June 24. Since I couldn't decide between the two, maybe I am called to bring forth both of them!

While the history books are kind to St Thomas More, he lived in a very divided England; one where King Henry VIII was overturning papal rule (so he could marry someone besides his wife) and making himself Head of the Church. I cannot imagine an ego as large as that, but it happened all the same. Thomas was requested as an advisor by the King because he and his family were steadfast in their faith and models of God-fearing people. Thomas even made sure his daughters were well educated and that was seldom the case at that time in history. Women were useful as tools like a hammer or nail to be used and married off as was most efficient for bearing children, social status or property inheritance. Thomas struggled to maintain his place as advisor to the King because he was conflicted about the King's efforts to replace the Pope, and eventually he had to resign.

Thomas would not swear an oath of allegiance to the new kingdom and King Henry VIII so he was marked a traitor. He was beheaded on July 6, 1535, all because of a king's fondest love desires. During fifteen months in prison, he wrote to his daughter, Meg, that he was "I trust only in God's merciful goodness. His grace has strengthened me till now and made me content to lose goods, land, and life as well, rather than swear against my conscience. I will not mistrust him, Meg, though I shall feel myself weakening and being overcome with fear. I shall remember how St Peter at a blast of wind began to sink because of his lack of faith, and I shall do as he did: Call upon Christ and pray to him for help. And then I trust he shall place his holy hand on me and, in the stormy seas, hold me up from drowning. The king's good servant but God's first." St Thomas More is the patron saint of lawyers.

St Thomas More knew he was to die at the hands of an earthly king, but he knew a greater King awaited him in Heaven!

John the Baptist, a cousin born six months before Jesus himself, was the man chosen by God to foretell the miracle of Jesus. John was a miracle himself in that he was born to Zachary and Elizabeth (Mother Mary's sister) when Elizabeth was long past childbearing age! Gabriel, who was a busy angel that year, said to Zachary, "You shall name him John. He will be a source of joy and delight to you, and many will rejoice at his birth for

he will be great in the sight of the Lord." John preached the coming of Jesus all over Judea, and many people were converted. He baptized the in the River Jordan and some remained as his disciples. When John denounced King Herod for the atrocious immoralities taking place at Court, he was beheaded for speaking the truth to those most offended. Jesus himself revered John because of the humility and service he exhibited in proclaiming another's magnificence with God. Once Jesus began his journey of gathering and forming believers, he went to John the Baptist to be baptized, and John said, "He must increase. I must decrease." Each understood the role of the other. Family ties, God's direct miracles and faith beyond belief are the hallmarks of Anna and Joachim, Mary and Joseph, Zachary and Elizabeth.

I challenge all of you to take a moment and find one thing you can do to strengthen your family in your faith. Pray at meals, pray together and bedtime or teach someone to pray, "Jesus, I need you." Give it a try!

One final image for you: After June 24, the days become longer until December 25, when the light of the sun increases again. *

May God bless each and every one of you in your struggles during the pandemic, racial unrest and family issues. Hang in there!

DEACONS' CORNER


After serving 30 years in the military I've come across many sayings that Soldiers, active duty and retired, will say. One such saying is "Keep you head down and your powder dry". In lay terms it means to keep you head down with being concealed and safe while on the battlefield while keeping your powder dry from becoming wet and thus ineffective with firing your weapon. Your weapon is especially important since it is used to defeat your enemy and win battles.

I once heard a story about Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta who was about to board an airplane on one of her travels to deliver a speech. As the passengers were being briefed by security prior to boarding, one of the questions was to ensure that no weapons would be boarded on the aircraft. The next question was to ask if anyone had any weapon to declare at this time. No one at first raised their hand, said or did anything! Suddenly a small tiny hand raised up, the hand of Mother Teresa. Everyone was in shock! How could this tiny sister, a Loretto Nun, have a weapon? Mother Teresa was asked to come forward and as she did, she held out her hand with her weapon – A Rosary!

Mother Teresa knew the power of the Rosary! Just as the soldier on the battlefield uses his weapon to fight and win battles so Mother Teresa used the power of praying the Rosary for the conversion of souls throughout the world, for the sick, dying, the innocent, and for so many intentions.

The name rosary comes from "Rosarium" (a rose garden) which designates the fifty points of mediation from each rosary being said. The rose, a symbol of joy, was fittingly applied to Our Virgin Mother Mary, who is the "Cause of Our Joy" with bringing us Our Lord, Jesus Christ into the world.

The "soul" of the Rosary lies in pondering the Joyful, Sorrowful, Luminous and Glorious mysteries of redemption. Treasuring each mystery in our hearts as we pray them, just as the Virgin Mary did



when these mysteries were unfolding before her contemplative gaze.

Throughout the centuries the Virgin Mary has appeared and specifically requested that we pray this powerful weapon of the Church – the Rosary!

One such event is when Jesus sent His Loving Mother from heaven to the small town of Fatima, Portugal in the year 1917. The Virgin Mary appeared to three little shepherd children, Lucia de los Santos, and Francisco and Jacinta Marto—brother and sister. Our Lady appeared six times and every time repeated this message: Pray the Rosary! She revealed her name and identity as Our Lady of the Rosary.

Here are some of the reasons that the Blessed Mother wants us to pray the Rosary: She told us to pray the rosary for it is the biblical prayer of the mysteries of Christ; we can know, imitate and love Jesus Christ for it summarizes the Gospels of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus; it lifts us up to new heights of holiness; it brings peace to the world; assists us with conquering vices; brings families together; spiritual weapon with conquering the evil one – the devil; providing stored spiritual treasures for us in Heaven.

As St. Mother Teresa showed us the powerful weapon of the Church – the Rosary, our Blessed Mother implores us, as she did at Fatima to the three little shepherd children, "Pray the Rosary!"





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and if previous weekends are an indication, the Lake area will have large influx of people. This isn't the time to relax our discipline. We will continue to keep to the script that was published on May 7 which also reflect current public health recommendations and Diocesan recommendations.

One change from the CDC is noted, the change from 60 to 65 for beginning the age group that may be at higher risk for severe sickness from COVID-19. We will continue to enforce social distancing with the help of ushers and seating restrictions. Since the use of a face covering is a clear recommendation and an effective practice in keeping people healthy—including the CDC recommendation to high risk groups to avoid gatherings where masks are not worn—we will continue to require masks in church at Our Lady of the Lake. I would like to remind people that daily Masses afford an opportunity for worship for folks who would otherwise want to avoid larger crowds.

I understand that the protocols for worship have created hardship for many. The ushers and other ministers, including those who stay behind to clean the pews and other

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surfaces, are giving many extra hours of service. Many people still are not coming to services out of a reasonable caution for their family's health. The challenge of finding a parking spot and entering church easily has discouraged participation. Some folks are unable to comply with best practices for being with others and our notion of community has been tested.

I know people are struggling with patience. We all wish it would go away soon. We are getting tired and discouraged, and even tempted to doubt that all our efforts are in vain. In my conversations with people about the desire for patience, I remind them that patience and compassion have the same root. Both are words born out of suffering. Patience isn't the absence of suffering but instead the ability to turn suffering into an occasion of grace, taming immediate flurry of emotions, and finding the strength to endure. Compassion too is born of suffering. Compassion is solidarity with the pain of others. In the grace of compassion, God is revealed in Christ as we embrace our cross and share His cross as we carry the cross of another.



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
